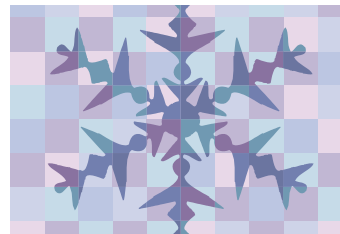
Winter programs are back in full swing. Check the monthly calendar (available at the information desk) for times/schedule.

Do you realize how important volunteers are at OPC? The saying goes that “many hands make light work” and that is very true in our church community. Here’s a partial list of what volunteers do in a year: Greeting, ushering, gardening, serving coffee, making sandwiches and sweets, building maintenance, painting, wiring, singing in the choirs, bell ringing, playing musical instruments, Kid Zone assistants, computer

expertise, sound booth operations, nursery caregiving, Korean - English lessons and translation, newsletter publishing, leading the youth, prayer room facilitation, pew rack filling, bulletin folding, counting offering, Communion preparation and serving, Scripture reading, Welcome Desk greeting, seasonal decorating, leading Bible studies, organizing the bazaar, knitting and quilting, wood-working, preparing break-

fasts, Session, pastoral caregivers, prayer partners, and much more.

When added up – over 1000 positions are filled by the willing people of OPC. So, we acknowledged our many helpers at a luncheon on January 17, at 12:30 in the Upper Room. Our church cannot function without so many hands to make the work light as we inspire passionate believers in Christ.

Session reports....

OPC’s **Annual Congregational Meeting** will be **April 3, 2016, at 3 pm**. This is an important event in our congregation’s life. The budget will be approved and **new elders will be elected** to serve a 6 year term on Session, the body that guides and serves our congregation.

There will be six positions to be filled for the term May 2,

2016 – April 30, 2022. Session has formed a nominations team comprised of Olive Bell, Carolyn Oudyk, Bob Shirley, and Rev. Hoekstra. Candidates for Session must be members of Oakridge Presbyterian Church and be ‘an example to the believers in speech, conduct, love, faith and purity’ (Book of Forms 106.1). Nominations must

be in writing. Members must receive 2 nominations and give their consent before their name can stand for election to eldership. Nominations should be addressed to Bob Shirley, Clerk of Session, and may be left at the church office or given to Bob by Jan. 25, 2016.

Oakridge Retreat...

Oakridge in the Community & the World...



In response to the current refugee crisis the 25 churches of the Presbytery of London are undertaking efforts to sponsor two refugee families to come to Canada.

In September 2015, a steering committee was formed with members from five different Presbyterian churches to guide the process of the Refugees to Canada refugee sponsorship program.

All churches in the Presbytery were encouraged to collect donations and hold fundraising events. Oakridge Presbyterian Church held a very successful fundraising campaign called "Tenting in the Parking Lot: Do S`more for Refugees" on October 30, 2015, which raised almost \$10,000. The initial financial goal was \$27,000 to sponsor a family of four, but when Presbyterian World Services and Development gave notice that a family of six was available, the necessary funds increased to \$32,000. Thanks to the overwhelming support of the congregations within the Presbytery of London, as well as the greater London community, and the Mayor's office of London, the total donations collected to date are \$40,000.

OPC has helped sponsor one family already!

There have been wonderful donations from so many congregations and individuals. For example, St. Lawrence Presbyterian Church sold Christmas trees and donated \$3,000 towards the refugee fund. A young boy in our own congregation made cookies, sold them to friends and family, and collected \$140.00 which he then donated to the refugee fund. Additionally, a call for in-kind donations was answered with all items received for this first family as well as some to support the next family. Sharon Zwarts (zwart.s@rogers.com) is heading up the master list of in-kind donations. People have been generous and want to help.

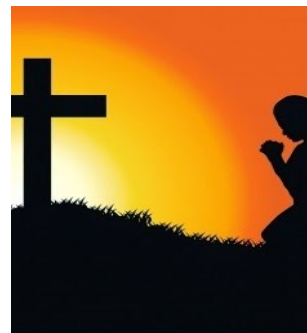
Right now we are awaiting further notice from PWS&D about the exact arrival date of the first refugee family, a Syrian family of six. This family includes a mom and dad, an 8 year old girl, 5year old girl, 4 year old boy and 2 year old girl.

Teams have been organized into Housing, Reception, Finance, Transportation, Interpretation, Orientation, Health Care, Education and Childcare, Employment and Culture and Recreation teams.

A member of Chalmer's Presbyterian Church has offered to move in with her daughter and let the refugee family stay in her home until they can settle into permanent housing. A member of St. George's Presbyterian Church is offering a 3 bedroom

duplex apartment within the rent range of the family.

Continue to pray for the Al Mu-taleb family as they anxiously await word for transportation to Canada. Our contact person (Rob Shropshire) at head office has told us that we may only get a few days notice before their arrival. We thank God as we look forward with joy and anticipation to welcome this refugee family to Canada.
